Links to future topics:

Children will get use appropriate vocabulary to talk of the passing of time and to compare the difference between then and now during Marvellous Medicine topic later in the year, The Romans in Year 3, The Dark Ages in Year 4 and the Battle of Britain in Year 6. In Year 3 and 6 they will also get another chance to look at the impact of events on people from the time.

The children's work on chronology will be continued in Year 3 when learning about the Stone Age and Year 5 during an Ancient Greece topic.


